Reflection on the Sunday Gospel

Jesus is familiar with the lives of the ordinary people of his time who mostly lived in the country. So, he talks about outdoor scents of shepherding and farming and domestic scenes in simple one room

houses. The homes of the rich are seen only through the kitchen door – the view of servants and slaves. There are donkeys, sheep, wolves and birds; seeds, wheat and harvests; lilies of the field and fruit trees, patched wineskins and household lamps; children arguing in the marketplace and shady merchants. People are threatened by drought and the din of war is never distant. Jesus sees life through the eyes of the poor and humble of the land. In the parable of the sower the seed is sown by being thrown on the ground and then ploughed under. Hardly surprisingly three quarters of the seed that lands on a footpath, on rocky ground and among thorns produces no grain. The surprise of the parable is that a quarter of the seed produces remarkable results up to a hundredfold, more than making up for the loss. Jesus wants us to know that God's kingdom is that way: extraordinary results from seeming failure. Sadly the worries of this world and the lure of riches often choke the word of God today.

Fix the Food System Salina's letter to the World Bank

CAFOD's food campaign is urging the World Bank to protect the right of farmers around the world to use their own seeds.

Seeds are life. They are the very foundation for farmers to produce the food that feeds us all. For generations, small-scale farmers have freely swapped and shared a wide variety of seeds to produce food and maintain biodiversity. More recently, farmers have also developed seeds that ensure crops are resilient to climate change. However, their right to choose what seeds they use is increasingly under threat as new laws are introduced across the world that limit what small farmers can do with their seeds.

These laws, which are being brought in with the support of global financial institutions such as the World Bank, overwhelmingly favour large agribusinesses. Instead of being able to choose their own seeds, small farmers must purchase commercial seeds – something that is good for big business profits but not so good for the farmers who grow the majority of the world's food.

It's clear that our current global food system is in crisis, and at the heart of this crisis is a struggle over control of the world's seeds. Protecting the freedom of farmers to choose seeds is a right we must all stand up for if we are to tackle global hunger while responding to the cry of the earth and the poor.

Sign Salina's letter

Salina, a small-scale farmer from Bangladesh, has written a letter to the World Bank, which has a lot of influence over agricultural issues, asking them to protect the rights of small farmers to use and share their own seeds.

<u>Next Sunday 23rd July, the Justice & Peace Group and</u> <u>the Live Simply group will be outside the churches in</u> <u>both our parishes asking you to sign Salina's letter.</u>
